


## Increase in Taxpayer-Funded Tuition Vouchers to Private Schools 2023-24 to 2024-25

The 2024-25 school year is the first time North Carolina's taxpayer-funded private school voucher program (i.e., Opportunity Scholarship voucher program) has no income limits. Even the wealthiest families—with incomes greater than \$260,000/year—can now receive a \$3,360 voucher (per child) to help offset tuition at a private school. Families with lower incomes can receive up to \$7,460 per child. **Private schools in** 

wealthy urban/suburban counties gained the most, leaving mostly rural counties to subsidize their private school education.
