NC PRIVATE VOUCHER SCHOOL CURRICULUM

Taxpayers have already spent nearly **half a BILLION** this year for **private school tuition vouchers**, most going to schools whose curriculum is **not aligned to the North Carolina Standard Course of Study** (NCSCOS). Public schools have to use these state-mandated academic standards. **Private schools receiving public tax dollars should also be required to select curriculum materials that meet or closely align with the content standards established by the NCSCOS**.

SCHOOL VOUCHER PROGRAM

The Opportunity Scholarships (school voucher program) was originally established to provide tuition money for low-income students in public schools who wanted to attend private schools. The eligibility requirements have changed a lot, allowing any student to get tuition money.

CURRICULUM STUDY FAST FACTS...


67% of voucher money- almost \$300M in 2024-25 went to private schools that teach biblical worldview curriculum.




Out of 642 private schools, 470 (73%) are religious schools and 172 (27%) are nonreligious schools.



Only 47 (a mere 7%) of North Carolina voucher receiving private schools follow the NC Standard Course of Study.

The NCSCOS standards required in public schools focus on preparing students for college-level courses or the workforce in the 21st-century. Most private schools are not using these curriculum standards that align with the admission guidelines established by the UNC system and other state university systems.

NC STANDARD COURSE OF STUDY (NCSCOS)

North Carolina public schools have **rigorous requirements** that focus on developing skills such as **critical thinking**, collaboration, communication, and **adaptability**, in addition to specific subject matter knowledge.

BIBLICAL WORLDVIEW

Biblical Worldview curriculum often use Abeka or Bob Jones Press materials. Experts question the ability of these curriculum to prepare students for the 21st-century. They often **exclude** scientific evolution content in biology courses and integrate religious ideology into history lessons.

NONRELIGIOUS, NON-NCSCOS

These schools use an approach that is **not the NCSCOS or religious**. Some of the curriculum is unspecified, others are **Montessori**, project based learning, or focused on students with disabilities. The Top 20 voucher-receiving private schools in 2024-25 were religious, specifically Christian. 18 of them taught the biblical worldview curriculum.

- Explain how Christians attempt to reconcile the biblical account of Creation with evolution.
- Relate hormones to physical and spiritual responses.
- Explain how the Fall has affected the culture's view of love and human sexuality.
- Relate photosynthesis to life in the biosphere according to Genesis 1:29-31.
